Student Contracts Motion

CUSU Notes:

- 1. That the Congregation of Colleges, in Oxford, has created a "Student Contract" which it is encouraging its members to make students to sign, on matriculation.
- 2. That this contract aims to make it impossible for students to sue the University should they feel that the university has not provided adequate levels of education.
- 3. In a section headed "Your Undertakings", the following vague phrase: "You undertake to pursue such studies as are required of you by any tutor... or other qualified person assigned by the college to teach you."
- 4. That should such a contact be successfully implemented in Oxford, it is probable that Cambridge will follow the lead.

CUSU Believes:

- 1. That it should have a pre-emptive policy on "Student Contracts".
- 2. That the University should not attempt to force students to sign contracts which set out unfulfillable expectations.
- 3. That any contract which requires students to attend all lectures and supervisions discriminates against those who may have legitimate reasons for absence (e.g. religious observance, medical appointments or child-minding).
- 4. That any contract which sets lecture attendance as part of a student's legal responsibility aims to fundamentally change the relationship between the students and the University.
- 5. The lack of formal requirements for attendance encourages a level of self-discipline which sets Oxbridge graduates apart from those from other Universities.
- 6. That a contract which formally sets out what each student should expect from the University, without placing unreasonable demands on the student, would be of benefit to students.
- 7. That if the University's education is of a high enough standard, it should need to worry about being sued.

CUSU Resolves:

- 1. To oppose any attempt by the University to introduce similar "Student Contracts" unless they will be of demonstrable benefit to the students.
- 2. To inform the Council, at the earliest opportunity, should any part of the University or College begin to consider such contracts.
